

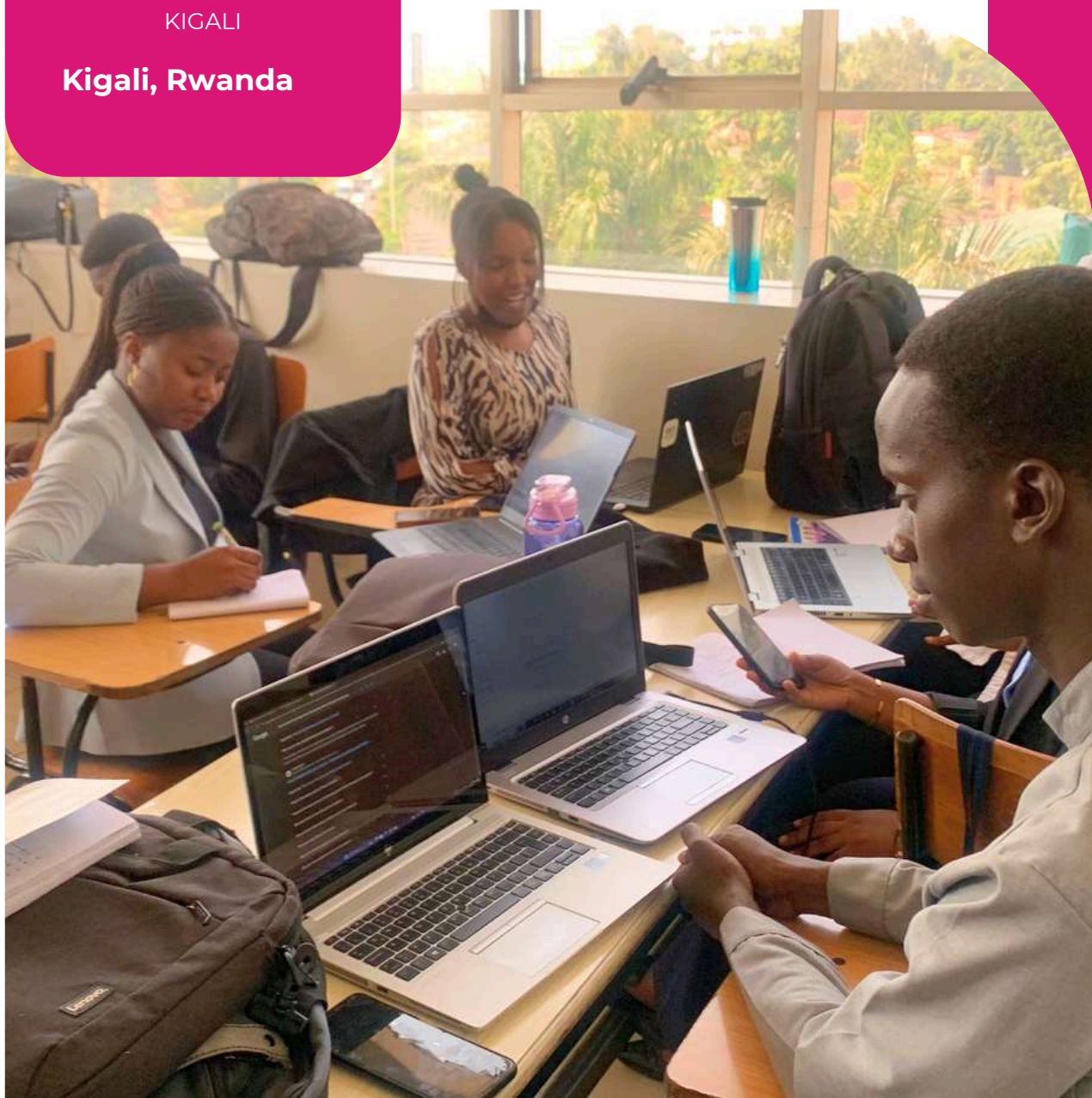

SUMMARY

Professors Without Borders, in partnership with the University of Kigali, sent two volunteer professors (Majeks Walker, LL.M. and Andy Ohemeng Asare, Ph.D.) and one volunteer assistant (Alexis Walker) to Kigali. Over five days, our professors delivered courses in data analysis, computer science, and law in computer science to undergraduate students at the university. We had over 210 students in attendance from different faculties, namely, Criminal and Economic Law, Law of Obligations and Legal Research and Data Science. This programme enhanced students' understanding of the intersections of law and data.

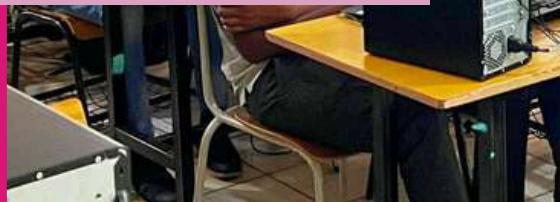
