

# 21ST CENTURY SKILLS ESSENTIAL SKILLS FOR THE MODERN WORKFORCE

### **SUMMARY**

Professors Without Borders was delighted to deliver its 21st Century Skills: Essential Skills for the Modern Workforce programme to 156 faculty members and students at Academic City University in Accra, Ghana, from 9 to 13 June 2025.

The week included two day-long workshops for faculty and staff on blended learning and AI Literacy. There was also time for staff to book 1:1 sessions with Professor John Schulz and Mrs Emily Bastable to discuss these topics in more detail.

The professors then ran multiple 2-hour-long workshops with the students, with Professor John Schulz teaching about using video and podcasts for learning, and Mrs Emily Bastable teaching students about how to demonstrate mastery of effective communication, critical thinking, creativity, and collaboration skills to potential employers.

Overall, ACU was delighted with the insightful topics and engaging facilitation. For faculty and staff, the topics on blended learning and AI were timely as they embark on curricular reviews, meaning that they could implement their learning almost immediately. There was never a dull moment in the classrooms, which much laughter and discussion. Students felt more confident about finding employment and using videos and podcasts during their degree programme, with many being encouraged to start their own.

#### Feedback received from programme coordinators and participants

That's why I felt the programme was so timely for where we are as an institution. The fit was just perfect. For me, it was worth all the effort we put into bringing it to life. The feedback from faculty has echoed the same sentiment. I've been part of some curriculum review conversations, and I can already see them incorporating some of the lessons. Some faculty who initially thought AI was a no-go area are now actively exploring how to integrate it. They're thinking more about blended assessments and ways to make AI a more active part of their teaching.
