SUMMARY

Professors Without Borders, in partnership with African Rural University (ARU), delivered its 2025 programme in Kagadi, Uganda, from 25 August to 5 September under the theme "Igniting Creative Research and Sustainable Innovation for Rural Transformation."

Students explored Community-Based Participatory Action Research (CBPAR), research ethics, and survey design, developing their own research questions and community asset maps. Photovoice assignments encouraged students to document local realities and connect theory to practice, preparing them for upcoming survey construction and data analysis.

Hands-on sessions in upcycling gave students the chance to turn plastic waste into earrings, bangles, and necklaces. Facilitator Tabi Mughal guided participants through design thinking and product creation, while Professor Akbar Saeed introduced small business planning and cost analysis, showing how upcycling can become a viable enterprise.

The programme concluded with an Indigenous Knowledge Exhibition, where students showcased their research projects, upcycled products, traditional foods, and cultural performances. Guest of Honour Ms. Alija Christian, Community Development Officer of Bwikara Subcounty, praised ARU and Professors Without Borders for empowering rural youth with practical skills in research, entrepreneurship, and environmental stewardship. Certificates were awarded to participants, who left motivated to apply their new knowledge in creating sustainable solutions for their communities.






Feedback received from programme participants

I used to think plastics were not useful, but this programme has made me aware of their importance through upcycling. I also learnt how to turn a small business into a big one, and this will help me share ideas with people at home on how they can start small businesses and grow them over time."
